


CONGRATULATIONS, JEAN, MARY, JP, AND ROBIN! 2023 RIDERS OF THE YEAR

adeptness and the gratitude they exude towards all that they encounter. They provide a refreshed outlook on learning new skills, facing fears and living each day to its fullest. To be a small part of returning some independence to their


lives is both a joy and a privilege.



A LEGACY OF LOVE A FOUNDERS REFLECTION OF 30 YEARS



Often as we get older, we reminisce of the past: our family, friends, accomplishments wishes. Our children are grandchildren grown, spouse gone, friends - some still here and some gone and WOW those were great years. Memories - I treasure mine and Jackson Hole Therapeutic Riding is at the top of the list.

I remember one special boy, Craig. He came to us at two

years of age. He couldn't sit up, couldn't talk, couldn't crawl or walk. DeDe McDonald our therapist lifted him on to the back of "Big Deal". Laid him on his tummy and we began - at first just walking him around. Later we put a rider up to hold him in a sitting position. DeDe did her magic with him and I am very proud to say Craig walked in to his first-grade class with a walker to aid him and had started talking. That was definitely a WOW!

Then there was Jon. Jon is probably almost 50 years old today. He started riding with us when he was about 18. He is nonverbal, but he learned to tell the horse to "walk on" with his hand and he never wanted to get off. Although he could not tell us with words his smile said it all. Pure bliss.

You must know about Johnny. He had autism. He participated with us for years but one time when he arrived he threw a fit. Screaming, kicking and refusing to get on the horse. We struggled but were able to lift him up and start the horse walking. That was a super horse. The screaming, flopping around etc. didn't bother him and after a minute or two Johnny calmed down and participated in the ride. He rode with us for years. Graduated from High school and went on to the University of Wyoming.

One of my favorites was a little girl from Idaho. Her parents brought her over every week. She was blind and could not walk or talk, but when she was laying down on the back of the horse feeling its warm body and soft hair with the motion of the walk she smiled and was happy.

So many memories. I do treasure them and as to my wish – I hope IHTR brings as much happiness to its riders, volunteers, staff, and supporters as it has brought to me. It's special and to describe it I would say it's LOVE!!

EMPOWERING ABILITITIES IN MORE WAYS THAN ONE



This year, a remarkable group of young adults with disabilities, who once started their journey as kids riding at Jackson Hole Therapeutic Riding, have now emerged as our first Teton County

School District interns, taking on roles as sidewalkers, horse leaders, equine support and teacher's assistants.

This program began in September of 2022 when students from Jackson Hole High School and the Transition Academy came to Jackson Hole Therapeutic Riding for an educational outing. They participated in volunteer training and helped out around the arena. All of the students who joined us that day had previously participated as riders both with Teton County School District and privately. A majority expressed a continued appreciation for the program, but no longer had interest in riding themselves. However, that day both JHTR and TCSD staff were awed by their focus, dedication and genuine interest in the behind the scenes of JHTR lessons. An idea was born - could these young adults, who were previously IHTR participants, now act as volunteers in the lessons that helped shape so many years of their lives? We invited them all back for the next couple weeks to see how it went, and the response was unbelievable. All of the students settled into their roles quickly, and took such pride in giving back to their community. Additionally, the parents of the participants whose classes the interns were in were moved by the support their kids were receiving. Many mentioned how inspired they felt that their young

This program included a presentation over the winter to JHHS special education students and Transition Academy



students about JHTR, general information about internships, volunteer positions at JHTR as well as employee etiquette. The potential interns then filled out applications, and completed an interview process during which they formally applied for whatever position most interested them. They were each given a schedule, information to clock in and out, a nametag to wear and the staff they were to report to.

As interns in lessons they contributed not only to the participants' experiences but also to the overall program's success. Their insights into the challenges and triumphs of navigating the world with disabilities made them effective mentors, demonstrating resilience and determination to those they support. They understood firsthand the impact that participating at JHTR can have, and their presence as sidewalkers adds a layer of empathy and encouragement that goes beyond traditional volunteer roles.

Additionally, two interns joined us as sidewalkers at the 2023 Stomping the Divots, and when a younger rider was feeling nervous and overwhelmed, it wasn't the JHTR staff who were able to refocus the rider, but two of our interns. They displayed kindness, maternity and understanding at a time when this child needed it most - and it was incredible to witness

These interns are more than just participants; they are trailblazers breaking down barriers. Through their dedication, they challenge preconceived notions about what individuals with disabilities can achieve. They exemplify a commitment



to inclusivity, proving that everyone has a valuable role to play in creating a supportive community. Their presence not only enriches the participant experience, but also serves as inspiration for the future generations of JHTR participants to aspire to.

CONGRATULATIONS, MARA!

As our organization continues to grow and evolve, we recognize the need to adapt to ensure that all aspects of our operation are addressed in the most optimal, effective, and cohesive manner. To that end, we created the year-round position of Equine Director that will help us to better serve our herd and position ourselves for continued success.

It is my pleasure to announce that effective January 1, 2024, Mara Kingscott (current Volunteer Coordinator) will assume the new title of Equine Director. Mara has been an integral part of our team since 2019 and has consistently demonstrated exceptional leadership, dedication, and expertise.

The Equine Director will have the primary responsibility of overseeing all operational and administrative functions related to the JHTR herd. Through the development, management, and administration of equine training, conditioning, and health care, the Equine Director will ensure that the most excellent care is provided to our horses throughout the year. She will provide the day-

to-day leadership and management of JHTR's herd to ensure that equines are in prime condition, physically and mentally, and trained for safe, effective, and enjoyable equine-assisted activities and therapies. Additionally, acquisition of new horses and expanding the herd will be among her top priorities, allowing for JHTR to serve a greater number of participants moving forward.
