GRANT FUNDINGPROVIDES SHELTER

As our clientele has grown, so too has the need to expand our program resources. At the most fundamental level, more riders require more horses. More horses in turn necessitate other additional resources, such as shelter.

As JHTR does not have onsite pasture, horses must be housed in stalls Monday through Friday. With space for only ten horses in our existing permanent stalls, additional stalls have become necessary

In April, just before the start of session, the JHTR staff worked together to construct four stalls and shade structures. An unexpected snow storm made for a wet, chilly build day and highlighted the necessity of the shelters.

JHTR wishes to thank to the Community Foundation of Jackson Hole and the Manne McGregor Charitable Fund whose grant funding made this project possible. We are immensely grateful for their support and generosity in sheltering our most critical resource—our horses.

EMPOWERED, INVIGORATED, AND HUMBLED JHTR AIMS FOR FULL CAPACITY




Last year, ridership capacity was reduced to roughly 60% in order to protect the health and safety of participants, volunteers, and staff amid coronavirus concerns. Today, as the country emerges from the restrictions of the last two years, we are excited to announce our plan to return to full capacity!

With more participants seeking our services this year than ever before, it is evident that increasing our capacity is essential. But it also means an even greater need for volunteers, horses, and financial support in order for JHTR to reach this goal while continuing to deliver effective and affordable services.

Increased capacity, however, does not mean a return to our pre-COVID state. Throughout the pandemic, we learned valuable information, gained profound insight, adopted new tools, and discovered innovative approaches to service delivery. Our team grew stronger, wiser, and more resilient. As an organization, we became even more grounded and clear on our mission.

In the world of equine assisted services, horses are—understandably—a requisite for program delivery. Simply having four legs, a mane and tail, however, does not a suitable therapy horse make. To be a therapy horse requires innate personality traits that cannot be taught. Therapy horses are naturally quiet, patient and forgiving animals. They are tolerant of their environment and of their riders, enjoy attention, have exceptional ground manners, and are accepting of people on all sides of them while being ridden. Because participants' actions are not always predictable, a therapy horse must also tolerate a sudden shout or spastic movement.

Due to their vital role, we are extremely selective in determining which horses are accepted into our herd. We use a set of strict criteria and a multi-step evaluation process to ensure a horse will adequately fulfill our program needs and safety requirements.

Initial Evaluation: Here we consider the horse's age, health history, conformation, temperament, and soundness.

Site Visit: If deemed a prospect, a site visit is scheduled to evaluate the horse in its current environment. JHTR staff assess the horse on the ground and under saddle, exposing them to various props and circumstances common in our programs.

Trial Period: If a horse passes all mandatory evaluation criteria and meets the current needs of the program, it will move onto a 14-day trial period at the JHTR facility. The horse's aptitude for the program is thoroughly evaluated through the abovementioned tests, as well as exposure to various therapy equipment, including our overhead lift. The horse's reactions, ongoing soundness, happiness, and ability to be stalled midweek as well as turned out with our current herd are scrutinized and graded.



Veterinary Check: Upon successful completion of the trial period, the horse must pass a comprehensive veterinary check to rule out any health concerns or unforeseen issues that might present excessive costs of care.

Purchase: After a nearly month-long process, JHTR eagerly welcomes the new horse to the herd. Ongoing training throughout the horse's tenure with the program will further develop and maintain skills critical to therapeutic activities.

Not all horses are equipped for work at a therapeutic riding facility. It takes a unique and special animal to fulfill this role. We are tremendously grateful for the exceptional horses that make up our herd and invite you to stop by the arena to witness them as they enrich the lives of those we serve.
